Subject: Making personal flotation devices/lifejackets mandatory for recreational boaters

Dear Transport Canada:

Parks and Recreation Ontario (PRO) is a strong advocate for accessible and safe water-based recreation. In Canada, approximately 100 people die while boating each year, with over 80% of fatalities occurring in incidents where a lifejacket/PFD was not worn. For this reason, PRO recommends that the Small Vessel Regulation be amended to make lifejacket/PFD wear mandatory for all ages, in recreational vessel types 6 metres or less in length. When worn properly, PFDs and lifejackets save lives.

<u>Powerboats and canoes present the highest risk</u> for fatal recreational boating incidents in Canada. Of the recreational boating incidents involving powerboats, <u>68% occurred in small vessels</u> (5.5 metres or less). Whether motor- or human-powered, lifejacket/PFD use is the most effective method for minimizing the risk of recreational boating-related fatalities.

Death rates in recreational boating incidents are <u>highest among adults</u> and <u>lowest among those under 15 years old</u>. Consequently, lifejacket/PFD wear rates among young people (under 18 years old) are <u>nearly double that of adults</u>. Therefore, this regulatory amendment will only be effective if adults are included amongst parties required to wear lifejackets/PFDs in recreational vessels.

Implementing this regulatory amendment will prevent avoidable deaths, unnecessary trauma, alleviate medical expenses, and ensure that all Canadians can safely enjoy water-based recreation.
